

Fiction Vs. Nonfiction... How are they different?!



TEXT FEATURES ARE THE PARTS OF A NONFICTION BOOK OR ARTICLE THAT HELP YOU FIND INFORMATION EASILY OR TELL YOU MORE ABOUT THE TOPIC.



- Table of Contents
- Headings/Subheadings

TITLE: THE NAME OF THE BOOK

- Titles tell the reader the topic of the text.
- Titles help us figure out the main idea of the text.
- Titles help the reader by letting them know what they are about to read.
- Titles focus the reader on a topic so they can make connections between
 what they already know and the text.



HEADINGS/SUBHEADINGS: DIVIDE THE TEXT INTO SECTIONS

- Headings tell the main idea of each section of text.
- Subheadings chunk text into smaller pieces under a heading and let the reader know what each section is about.
- Headings and subheadings are printed in large or bold type to make them stand out.
- Headings and subheadings help the reader to locate information in the text
 by telling them where to look.

Spelling tips

This card gives you some handy hints to help you work on your spelling.

Learn words in groups

Each group of words in this set of cards has something in common. For example, "neither, heir, weird" are all spelled with "ei" although they sound different.

Learning words in groups like this may help you remember how to spell them.

Helpful phrases

If you find it hard to remember how to spell a word, it often helps to use a little phrase to remind you. For example, to remember the spelling of "necessary" you can say, "A shirt has one collar and two sleeves." This reminds you that necessary has one "c" and two "s"s. You can make up your own phrases to help with whichever words you find difficult.

Picture the word in your head

When you're trying to remember how to spell a word, it helps to picture it in your head and run through it one letter at a time.

Break words into chunks

It's helpful to break some tricky words down into short sections when you think about them:

Wednesday = Wed - nes - day business = bus - in - ess

Make spelling fun

Photographs show how something looks, which helps the reader better understand the topic they are reading about. Photos give the reader a visual of the subject.


DIAGRAMS:

A DRAWING THAT SHOWS THE PART OF

SOMETHING

Diagrams show the reader the parts
 of something to help them better
 understand what is in the text.

Diagrams include labels for each part.



CAPTIONS:

THE WORDS NEXT TO OR BELOW A PICTURE THAT TELL WHAT IT IS OR WHAT IT IS ABOUT (Think of instagram or Tik Tok)



- A caption explains what is shown in a photograph or illustration.
- Captions help the reader understand information that may or may not be in the text.

BOLD WORDS: IMPORTANT WORDS THAT ARE DARKER THAN THE TEXT AROUND THEM

- Bold words tell the reader to pay attention these words are important!
- Bold words can be used for titles, headings, and key words like important vocabulary words.

WHY ARE TEXT FEATURES IMPORTANT?

- Text features help the reader to quickly find important information.
- Text features teach the reader about the topic.
- Text features can help the reader answer questions about a topic and the text they are reading.

- fiction Books
- fantasy

- comics / Jokes
