### **SCENE 1**

- **1** The city of Thebes. Throne room. King Pelias sits on a throne.
- **2 PELIAS** (laughing): Ha! I am now the king of Thebes! Nothing stands in my way.
- **3** (A guard enters.)
- **4 GUARD**: Jason, the son of Aeson, is here to see you, sire.
- **5 PELIAS** (scared): Jason? (to himself) He must know I took the throne from his father and put him in prison. He will want revenge. What am I going to do? (to Guard) Send him in at once.
- 6 (Jason enters.)
- **7 PELIAS**: Jason! Good to see you again, nephew.
- **8 JASON**: Thank you, uncle. I've come to speak to you about giving my father his throne back.
- **9 PELIAS**: You want me to give up the throne? Never.
- **10** (Jason grips the handle of his sword.)
- **11 JASON**: I don't want to fight you, uncle. But I'm ready to take it back by force if I have to.

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- **12 PELIAS** (to himself): There's no way I can defeat him in battle. I must think. Aha! I have it. (to Jason) I'll give up the crown without a fight. But you must first prove you are worthy to take it from me.
- **13 JASON**: Prove? What do I have to prove?
- **14 PELIAS**: I dare you to go and find the famous Golden Fleece. If you can bring it to me, the crown goes back to your father.
- **15 JASON** (thinks about it): I accept! I'll do it!
- **16** (Jason exits. King Pelias leaps back onto his throne.)
- **17 PELIAS**: The fool! Many have tried to take the fiercely guarded Golden Fleece from the King of Colchis. And they have all failed. Jason will fare no better! I shall rule Thebes forever!

#### **SCENE 2**

- **18** (The docks. A shipbuilder stands near a ship. The ship has a figurehead.)
- **19 JASON**: Shipbuilder! Is my ship ready?
- **20 SHIPBUILDER**: It is, sir. I've built you a ship finer than any that sailed the seas.
- **21 JASON**: Good. I shall call it the Argo.
- **22 SHIPBUILDER**: A fine name. But tell me, where are you going?
- **23 JASON**: I'm going in search of the Golden Fleece.
- **24 SHIPBUILDER** (nervously): Golden Fleece? But they say the Fleece is guarded by a dragon that never sleeps!
- **25 JASON:** Then I must put that dragon to sleep forever!
- **26** (Jason turns. A group of men appear on the dock. They are all strong and heroic.)
- **27 JASON**: You heroes will be my crew. And I shall call you my Argonauts.
- **28 ARGONAUTS** (raising their swords): Hail Jason!
- **29** (Jason and the Argonauts board the Argo.)
- **30 JASON** (to himself): I must find the Golden Fleece. But where do I start?
- **31** (The figurehead suddenly comes alive. It turns to look at Jason.)
- **32 FIGUREHEAD**: King Phineas will tell you where. Ask poor, poor Phineas.
- **33 JASON**: Phineas? (yelling) Argonauts! Prepare to set sail!

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#### **SCENE 3**

- **34** (King Phineas's dining room. King Phineas, Jason, and the Argonauts sit at the table eating.)
- **35 PHINEAS**: Eat, eat! Everyone eat! Now, Jason, where did you say you were going?
- **36** (Suddenly, a flock of Harpies enter the dining room. They knock over chairs and tables.)
- **37 PHINEAS** (yelling): The Harpies! Shelter under the table, sirs! You'll be safer there!
- 38 JASON (drawing sword): Nonsense! Up, men, and fight!
- **39** (Jason and the Argonauts fight the Harpies. The Harpies run out of the room. Jason laughs and fills a plate with food. He sets the plate in front of King Phineas.)
- **40 JASON:** Eat, friend, then tell us how to find the Golden Fleece.
- **41 PHINEAS** (begging): Don't try it! The Fleece hangs in the Land of Colchis, beyond the Clashing Cliffs. Think of that and tremble!
- **42 JASON**: Tremble? I, tremble? Ha! (to the Argonauts) Come on, men! Set sail to the Clashing Cliffs!

#### **SCENE 4**

- **43** (The Argo. Jason and the Argonauts are on deck. Just ahead, two walls of rock crash together like cymbals.)
- **44 ARGONAUTS**: Oh no! We shall be ground to dust! We're doomed!
- **45 JASON**: Watch the seagulls, men! They know when the way is safe. Lean on your oars, and follow the gulls!
- **46** (The Argonauts row furiously through the Clashing Cliffs. Just as the Argo reaches the other side, the Clashing Cliffs collide with a crash. Jason and the Argonauts cheer.)
- **47 JASON**: Excellent job, men. I see the Land of Colchis just ahead.
- **48 ARGONAUTS** (pointing): Look! It's the Golden Fleece!
- **49** (Jason and the Argonauts approach the garden. Jason is taken in by Princess Medea's beauty.)
- **50 MEDEA**: Who are you, brave one?

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- **51 JASON**: I am Jason, and these are my Argonauts. Who are you?
- **52 MEDEA**: My name is Princess Medea. I watched you fight the dragon-tooth warriors. You are a true hero, I can see that. But you'll need my magic if you are going to win the Golden Fleece from the dragon. Marry me and I'll help you.
- **53 JASON**: You're so beautiful that I'll willingly marry you. But I must lift down the prize by my own strength. Otherwise, I would be cheating. Where is the dragon?
- **54 MEDEA** (points off-stage): He is in there. Past all those bones.
- **55** (Jason walks off-stage. The Argonauts gather to look off-stage. Suddenly, the dragon roars)
- **56 ARGONAUT 1**: There it is! There's the dragon! It has no eyelids!
- **57 ARGONAUT 2**: It has no name!
- **58 ARGONAUT 3**: It has no pity!
- **59 MEDEA** (covering her eyes): I can't look!
- **60** (The dragon roars again off-stage. Jason cries out.)
- **61 ARGONAUT 1**: Oh no! Jason's sword shattered like glass!
- **62 ARGONAUT 2**: The dragon's teeth are tearing at his clothes!
- **63 ARGONAUT 3**: The dragon's breath scorched his hair!
- **64 MEDEA** (covering her eyes): Tell me when it's over! The dragon roars a third time.
- 65 ARGONAUT 1: Look! Jason has climbed a tree!
- **66 ARGONAUT 2:** The dragon has opened its mouth!
- **67 ARGONAUT 3**: Jason is raising his broken sword!
- **68 All**: Jason has just defeated the dragon!
- **69** (Jason enters. His clothes are torn and burned. He walks over to the Golden Fleece and takes it off the tree. He takes Princess Medea's hand.)
- **70 JASON**: Come on, men. I've stolen the king's Golden Fleece and his daughter. It's time to sail back to Thebes.
- **71 ARGONAUTS** (cheer): Yay! Hail Jason!

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#### **SCENE 5**

- **72** The city of Thebes. Jason and Princess Medea stand before Aeson, Jason's father. Aeson looks old and tired. King Pelias wears chains. The Argonauts stand in the background.
- **73 AESON**: Thank you for freeing me, my son. But I'm too tired to rule. You must be king.
- **74 MEDEA**: Trust me, father-in-law. I have magic to make you strong and young again. (pulls out **vial** from pocket) Here, drink this.
- **75 AESON** (drinks vial): Oh my! I feel like I have the body of a young man, and the wisdom of an old one. I have all the energy I need to rule Thebes.
- **76 PELIAS**: What about me? Make me young again, Medea! I'd give anything for that!
- **77 MEDEA** (pulls out another vial): I have a special potion for you too. Here, drink this.
- **78** (Pelias drinks the vial. Then he yawns and lies down on the floor. He snores loudly)
- **79 AESON**: Jason, thanks to you, the land of Thebes is saved! Let you and Medea live happily together as man and wife. Someday you, too, will wear my crown!

80 ARGONAUTS: Hail Jason!
